Focus on Production

Over 100 housing production laws have gone into effect since 2017.

An average of 114,000 homes and apartment units have been permitted annually since 2018.




Post-COVID: Greater Recognition of other Ps

Notable Housing Legislation in 2023:

Produce – Enacted 2024

	Bill	Theme	Description
PRODUCE Housing for All	AB 821 (Grayson)	Housing Accountability	Enforces consistency between general plan and zoning ordinances; legal remedy to ensure compliance.
	AB 1633 (Ting)		Reduces CEQA abuse by jurisdictions and strengthens Housing Accountability Act.
	AB 1033 (Ting)	ADUs	"Condoization of ADUs:" Allows property owners to construct an ADU on their land and sell it independently.
	SB 4 (Weiner)	Removing Barriers	"Yes in God's Backyard:" Streamlines affordable housing development on land owned by religious and higher education institutions.
	SB 423 (Weiner)		Expands SB 35, which established a housing streamlining process for cities that fail to meet RHNA allocations.
	SB 684 (Caballero)		Facilitates subdivision of multifamily zoned parcels to up to 10 for-sale lots by relaxing CEQA requirements, expediting and mandating timelines.

Notable Housing Legislation in 2023: Preserve and Promote

	Bill	Status	Description
PRESERVE	AB 919 (Kalra)	Dead	Would have established a new policy that gives tenants, local governments, and nonprofit agencies the first opportunity to purchase rental housing when listed for sale and gives them the right to match an offer.
PROMOTE	AB 531 (Irwin)	Enacted in 2024	\$6.3B bond to fund development of supportive housing units and treatment beds.
	SB 326 (Eggman)	Enacted in 2024	Modernizes Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) to provide ongoing resources for chronically homeless persons.

Notable Housing Legislation in 2023: Promote and Prevent

	Bill	Status	Description
PREVENT	SB 567 (Durazo)	Enacted in 2024	Revises no-fault just cause eviction provisions of the Tenant Protection Act of 2019; provides additional enforcement mechanisms.
	AB 12 (Haney)	Enacted in 2024	Bans landlords from charging more than one month's rent as a security deposit.
PROTECT	SB 555 (Wahab)	Enacted in 2024	Creates the Stable Affordable Housing Act of 2023 to create opportunities for social housing; requires state to develop, adopt, and submit to the legislature a Social Housing Study.

2024 Bills of Interest:

New Bills

	Bill	Description
PRODUCE	AB 1893 (Wicks)	Modifies "Builder's Remedy" to make it more usable and puts guardrails on certain "super-sized" projects
	SB 932 (Weiner)	Temporarily defers cities' collection of development fees and extends entitlements, allowing projects on pause due to high interest rates to retain key permits until market conditions improve.
PROMOTE	AB 1788 (Quirk-Silva)	Establishes homeless multidisciplinary teams in each county to expedite outreach and services to individuals experiencing homelessness. Allows the sharing of confidential information to coordinate supportive services .
PRESERVE	AB 1789 (Quirk-Silva)	Empowers HCD to provide loans or grants for rehabilitation and extend the long-term affordability of housing projects serving low or extremely low-income households.

2024 Bills of Interest:

Two-Year Bills

	Bill	Description
PRODUCE	AB 1657 (Wicks)	Authorizes the \$10 billion Affordable Housing Bond Act of 2024 to replenish and expand the state's affordable housing programs.
	SB 440 (Skinner)	Enables local governments to establish a regional housing authority that can raise, administer, and allocate funds for affordable housing.
	SB 450 (Atkins)	Cleans up SB 9 by prohibiting jurisdictions from creating additional requirements, setting specific application timeframes, and increasing accountability.
PROMOTE	AB 930 (Friedman)	Authorizes the creation of a Reinvestment in Infrastructure for a Sustainable and Equitable California district (RISE district), focused on infill transit and housing supportive infrastructure.
PRESERVE	SB 225 (Caballero)	Provides funding to mission-driven nonprofit housing developers to acquire and preserve unsubsidized affordable housing through the Community Anti-Displacement and Preservation Program.

Housing on the Ballot for 2024: March

Proposition 1

- Restructures how unsheltered individuals suffering from mental illness can receive care
- Expands the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA)
- Funds housing and beds for unsheltered individuals and veterans with mental health and substance use disorders











Housing on the Ballot for 2024:

November

ACA 1

Lowers the 55% voter-approval threshold for public infrastructure and affordable housing special taxes and bonds

SCA₁

Repeals Article 34 of the California Constitution, which requires local jurisdictions to approve any publicly-funded affordable housing

Justice for Renters Act

Repeals Costa-Hawkins and bars landlords from raising rents on vacant units.

Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act

Requires all new taxes passed by State leaders to appear on the ballot for voter approval


ACA 13

Requires future ballot measures that increase voter approval requirements to also pass by the same threshold





Overview of the Governor's Proposed Budget



California State Budget



- \$208 billion state spending plan
- \$38 \$68 billion deficit
 - \$1+ billion reversion for housing programs
 - \$600 million in delays to homelessness programs

February

Budget hearings begin in Legislature

June 15

Deadline for Legislature to pass budget

January 10

Governor releases proposed budget


May

Governor releases May revision

July 1

Deadline for Governor to sign budget

Homelessness Program Delays / Shifts



Homeless Housing,
Assistance, and Prevention
(HHAP)

Delay of \$260M from 2023-24 to 2025-26



Behavioral Health Bridge Housing

Shift of \$265M from 2023 budget to 2024-25

Delay of \$235M from 2024-25 to 2025-26



Behavioral Health Continuum Infrastructure (BHCIP)

Delay of \$140M from 2024-25 to 2025-26

California Student Housing Revolving
Loan Fund

Suspension of funding



Equitable Building Decarbonization Program

Reduction of \$283M; shift of \$87M

Maintains \$639M for the program
