## **1. Welcome and Introductions**

Chair Ann Kulchin, City of Carlsbad, called the meeting to order at 11:35 a.m. and introductions were made. She noted that Shelby Tucker, SANDAG, was absent to study for the bar exam, but had baked cookies for the group.

## **2. Public Comment/Communications**

Joe Kellejian, City of Solana Beach, announced that his city had instituted a beach alcohol ban.

## **3. Agenda Item #3, Summary of the April 3, 2008, Meeting**

Upon motion from Pam Slater-Price, County of San Diego, and seconded by Mr. Kellejian, the Working Group recommended approval of the April 3, 2008, meeting minutes.

## **4. Agenda Item #4, Shoreline Monitoring Report**

Greg Hearon from Coastal Frontiers presented the annual report for the Regional Shoreline Monitoring Program. Since the 2001 Regional Beach Sand Project (RBSP), there has only been one significant nourishment project, a 300,000 cubic-yard project in Imperial Beach. For the five years following RBSP, the wave and weather climate had been favorable for keeping sand on the beaches. However, in the last year, there were a number of significant wave events.

With more than 12 years of data, the beach monitoring program is becoming a significant resource, and includes beach surveys, aerial photos, dredging records, and lagoon maintenance data. Following the RBSP, most beaches had continued to see gains in beach width and shorezone volume. Through 2006, but after 2007, both width and volume greatly decreased due to the heavy wave climate. The RBSP had little effect on lagoon entrances.

Mr. Hearon also presented information on the Pratte's Reef removal project in El Segundo. The reef was built by the Surfrider Foundation from geotextile bags and is being removed since it did not show any benefits. Geotextile bags are cheap and fairly easy to fill and place, so they are popular for coastal protection projects. Removing the bags is more difficult, as they often degrade and come up in pieces. A complete recovery is difficult even with unlimited resources.

The reef showed neither surfing benefit or shoreline effects. Upon close inspection by divers, the reef showed signs of settlement, scour, and other damage. The removal is set for fall 2008 and will be the first offshore geotextile reef to be removed. Divers will attach lines to the bags and attempted to drag them onto the beach. It will cost as much to remove the reef as it did to put in. SANDAG should think about design effectiveness and a removal plan before putting anything in the water. Public expectations should also be managed, since it is an experimental technology.

Bob Hoffman, NMFS, asked what the cost differential between a rock structure and geotextile one would be. Mr. Hearon said he did not have an exact number, but it was likely on an order of magnitude. Cliff Davenport said that the life expectancy of a rock structure would be much greater than a geotextile one and might make up for some of the cost differential.

Mr. Bond asked if there were any positive benefits to habitat or anything else from the reef. Mr. Hearon said that the monitoring reports were not very comprehensive, but there did not seem to be any noticeable effects, positive or negative.

Pam Slater-Price, County of San Diego, said that Surfrider took a conservative approach and avoided the risk of doing harm, but also failed to make a big impact. However, they did show the importance of doing something that was removable since there is a lot that is unknown about this kind of reef technology. The UCSD supercomputer center had been useful in determining sewage flows from the Point Loma wastewater treatment plant and more modeling should be done before placing anything.

Mr. Hearon said that the best numerical models still are not as good as physical models. A physical model test in a large wave tank runs more than \$150,000, but this should be a necessity if you really want to see if the project can be effective.

#### **5. Agenda Item #5, Update on Regional Shoreline Management Efforts**

Rob Rundle, SANDAG, said there was no news to report on the state funding for the next RBSP. SANDAG has submitted a proposal to the Ocean Protection Council for Proposition 84 for an artificial reef project. A draft letter of support was included in the agenda packets for members who were interested in expressing their support for this project. The proposal also includes funding for the beach fills associated with the reefs, which would reduce the local obligation for the RBSP.

Steve Aceti said a letter from each council would be desired, as well as from groups like Surfrider, and the Seacoast Preservation Society. He also said that the Oil Piers Reef, which will be completed by the Army Corps as funds become available, would be a good model to see if reefs could work in the County. However, the federal appropriations bill which would provide more funding may be held up until after the presidential election.

#### **6. Agenda Item #6, Coastal Regional Sediment Management Plan**

Chris Webb, Moffatt & Nichol, gave the Working Group an overview of the Coastal Regional Sediment Management Plan (CSRMP), which is being funded by the state through the Coastal Sediment Management Workgroup. The goal of the plan is to better manage our existing sediment resources. Right now sediment is managed in a reactive manner, and the hope is to proactively get sediment from areas of excess to areas of deficit for the greatest public benefit. The CSRMP will include a grain size database and look at habitat constraints. It will also identify potential sources of sediment for the coast.

Based on some rough calculations, about 400,000 cubic yards of sand is lost per year, therefore, that amount and more is needed to bring the beaches into an uneroded state. The Sand Compatibility and Opportunistic Use Program (SCOUP) with the cities of Coronado, Encinitas, Imperial Beach, Oceanside, and Solana Beach and opportunistic fills in other cities will go a long way toward meeting this requirement. Large occasional fills such as the RBSP will be necessary to reach the target. Sand retention can be used to lower the amount of sand that is needed each year. A number of different options could be used for retention such as reefs, groins, or other creative solutions.

Mr. Webb said the draft plan was available on the Web site for review. Members are invited to provide input, especially on the governance and funding sections. To make the plan effective it has to be enforceable and have ways to pay for implementation.

Mr. Aceti said that it was important to get permits in place for sand placement since the region is loosing out on sand that could be placed on the beach. He also said that Camp Pendleton should be included in the plan.

Mr. Webb said there are seven different agencies that have to grant permits and this makes placement almost impossible on a project by project basis, but if a general program permit is in place, it could have great effects.

#### **7. Agenda Item #7, Legislative Update**

Mr. Rundle said that Senate Bill 1685 had been introduced by Senator Christine Kehoe to extend SANDAG's existing tax authority for transit and transportation to cover quality of life issues, such as beach sand, water quality, and habitat management. A draft letter of support was included in the agenda packet.

Ms. Slater-Price said that she was concerned the transit component would usurp funding that should be used by environmental projects. Mr. Rundle said that SANDAG already had authority to fund transit and that this bill is necessary to tax for environmental projects.

**Introduction**

The City of Encinitas is requesting funding from the California Coastal Commission Beach Sand Mitigation Fund administered by SANDAG for an Opportunistic Beach Nourishment Project. Allocation of funds from a coastal jurisdiction's account requires that jurisdiction's formal approval through resolution by the City Council. Resolution No. 2008-55 from the City of Encinitas is included as Attachment 1.

Additionally, prior to allocation of any funds, the proposal must be reviewed by the Shoreline Preservation Working Group (Working Group), adopted by SANDAG, and submitted to the Executive Director of the Commission for review and approval. The Working Group is asked to review and make a recommendation regarding this request.

**Recommendation**

The Working Group is asked to recommend that the Regional Planning Committee forward the request to the Board of Directors for approval of the allocation of funds from the Beach Sand Mitigation Fund and direct SANDAG staff to submit the proposal to the Executive Director of the Commission for review and approval.

**Discussion**

In 1996, SANDAG and the California Coastal Commission (Commission) entered into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) which outlines the administration of the Beach Sand Mitigation Fund (Mitigation Fund). The Mitigation Fund consists of fees collected by the Commission through its coastal development permit process pursuant to special conditions of various permits as mitigation for the adverse impacts of shoreline protective structures, such as seawalls and revetments, on beaches within the region. Mitigation fees are deposited in an interest bearing account created and managed by SANDAG. Only projects that involve sand replenishment for beaches in the San Diego region will be considered for funding.

The City of Encinitas plans to use \$133,621 in mitigation funds to place approximately 37,100 cubic yards of sand from the Pacific Station project underground parking structure onto the northernmost section of Batiquitos Beach. The City will use these funds for trucking the sand to the beach, preparing the site, and providing public safety. These uses are consistent with the SANDAG

Shoreline Preservation Strategy objectives, policies, and recommendations that relate to beach building and maintenance. Furthermore, the project meets the eligibility criteria laid out in the MOA.

The Pacific Station project, located on Highway 101 and E Street in Encinitas, consists of plans to develop a condominium subdivision, mixed use development with 47 residential units, approximately 10,000 square feet of restaurant space, and two floors of underground parking.

**RESOLUTION 2008 - 55**

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ENCINITAS, CALIFORNIA, TO REQUEST FUNDING FROM THE CALIFORNIA COASTAL COMMISSIONS BEACH SAND MITIGATION FUND ADMINISTERED BY SAN DIEGO ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS (SANDAG) FOR AN OPPORTUNISTIC BEACH NOURISHMENT PROJECT.**

**WHEREAS**, the Beach Sand Mitigation Fund consists of fees collected by the California Coastal Commission through its coastal development permit process pursuant to special conditions of various permits, as mitigation for the adverse impacts of shoreline protective structures, such as seawalls and revetments, on the beaches within San Diego County; and

**WHEREAS**, the mitigation fees are deposited in an interest bearing account created at SANDAG, with all interest earned payable to the account for purposes stated below; and

**WHEREAS**, the purpose of the account is to provide a beach sand mitigation fund to aid local governments, working cooperatively through SANDAG, in the restoration of the beaches within San Diego County; and

**WHEREAS**, the funds shall be solely used to implement projects which provide sand to the region's beaches; and

**WHEREAS**, the Pacific Station project will add 37,100 cubic yards of sandy material to the Batiquitos Receiver Site along the northern section of the coastline in Encinitas; and

**WHEREAS**, the developer will incur additional costs of \$133,621 for hauling the sand to the beach, site preparation and public safety; and

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the City Council of the City of Encinitas, California as follows:

1. That the foregoing recitations are true and correct.
2. According to the Memorandum of Understanding between the California Coastal Commission and SANDAG the Beach Sand Mitigation Funds are eligible for projects that move sand to the beach;
3. That the City Council approves the request for funding from the Beach Sand Mitigation Fund for \$133,621.

4. That SANDAG's Shoreline Preservation Working Group will evaluate the proposed beach replenishment project and determine if the money from the fund should be allocated to this project.
5. After adoption by SANDAG's Shoreline Preservation Working Group the request must be submitted to the Executive Director of the Commission for review and approval.



SUBJECT: Letter in Support of SANDAG's Application for Proposition 84 Funding

This letter is to express the support of [Organization/Agency name] for SANDAG's Proposition 84 funding proposal for the planning and construction of retention structures offshore of San Diego County. As part of the Regional Beach Sand Replenishment Project 2 (RBSP2), the retention structure will be designed to help reduce persistent coastal erosion, provide biological enhancements, and increase recreational opportunities for the residents and visitors of the region.

The region's beaches are a valuable economic resource and key part of the area's positive image and overall quality of life. The region has been highly involved in shoreline management and the design and planning of retention structures will bring this work to a new level.

In 2001, SANDAG spearheaded the highly successful Regional Beach Sand Replenishment Project (RBSP), which placed 2.1 million cubic yards of sand on the region's highly eroded beaches. An extensive monitoring program showed that many beaches widened significantly for several years, while others did not retain sand for extended periods. The project also did not cause significant adverse environmental impacts. This effort was deemed a successful pilot project and paved the way for additional similar future efforts to benefit the region's beaches.

The coastal cities in the San Diego region and SANDAG have now embarked on a second round of replenishments, the RBSP2. The region is committed to the successful planning and construction of the RBSP2 and has provided funding for the preliminary planning activities, which include an investigation of offshore resources and preliminary design/engineering. SANDAG is pursuing funding from the California Department of Boating and Waterways for the engineering, environmental analysis, and construction of the project. Proposition 84 funds from the Coastal Conservancy and Ocean Protection Council will be used for the planning and construction of retention structures, as well as the replenishment activities that occur as part of the project.

SANDAG has been at the forefront of shoreline management issues because of the significant tourism and recreational functions that our beaches provide. In 1993, the Board of Directors approved the *Shoreline Preservation Strategy for the San Diego Region*. The strategy recognized sand retention as one of a number of tactics that can be used to complement the placement of sand on the region's beaches. Retention structures have the potential to increase the cost effectiveness of beach sand replenishment activities and may help to reduce the environmental effects of beach filling.

With the benefits of the original RBSP clear, a similar project that enhances what was done in 2001 by including retention structures will clearly be beneficial to the region and the state. The proposed project will help retain sand in up to three of the most erosive spots in the region in a cost-effective and environmentally sensitive manner. The continued monitoring program will help verify the effectiveness of the project and will help to expand the understanding of sediment transport, bringing benefits beyond the locations of the retention structures.

The [Organization/Agency name] encourages the allocation of Proposition 84 funds so that the San Diego region and the coast of California can benefit from that latest erosion control technology and enjoy the recreational and environmental benefits they provide.
